Baby Piano for Intua BeatMaker 2

The Baby Piano is a Chinese Toy Piano. I found it at a flea market and it obviously has seen better days. There are 2 keys missing, its casing is worn out and there are loose parts in it. The sound is not even from one key to another partly because the mechanism of some keys is damaged and it's also not in tune.

It's nonetheless lovely and its sound begged to be sampled. I did not stop there and I also made unique resynthesized sounds from the original samples.

The BeatMaker 2 version is optimized for the Keyboard Sampler from the regular computer version. This basically means that there are no velocity layers. It has 15 instruments and the 5 included in the demo are indicated in the rightmost column of the table below.

The Sounds:

- Baby Piano real: The real thing, acoustic Baby Piano mapped from G3 to F5 only on white keys. The pitch heard does not match the key played except for G3.

- BP remap: Acoustic Baby Piano mapped chromatically from C3 to C6 with root notes that match the keys played.

- Baby Piano soft: Acoustic Baby Piano mapped from G3 to F5 only on white keys. The pitch heard does not match the key played except for G3. Uses softer velocities.

- BP remap soft: Acoustic Baby Piano mapped chromatically from C3 to C6 with root notes that match the keys played. Uses softer velocities.

The other sounds are resynthesized from the original acoustic samples. The wav files are included.

To make the 4 first acoustic instruments even more realistic, turn off the Volume Envelope and notes will play for their full length. Don't hesitate to tailor the sounds with the Volume Envelope. For instance, having a slower attack takes out the bite of the percussive attack.
